Out of the Blue Art


CHRISTINE CAMPBELL

I was influenced by great photographers and printmakers; legendary photographers like Ansel Adams and Edward Weston; and great printmakers like Laura Boswell and many more.






### Elisabeth Sykes

#### Pamela Schildroth

I have always been interested in all art forms and after attending Georgian College in Owen Sound in the Design Arts Program I was exposed to even more areas in the design world. From an early age I dabbled in sketching, water-color, oil paints, pastels and charcoal mediums. I then branched off into pottery and clay sculpting in college and successfully had two showings of my work at the Georgian College Art Show and the Owen Sound Art Gallery.

Recently I returned to painting of Indigenous Native culture and wildlife animals. Although pyrography, carving and relief carving birds of prey remain my focus, along with caricature carving, interpretive driftwood carving and building wooden Tall Ships from scratch. Several of my wood carvings have won top awards at the Grand Valley Wood Show and Carving Competition with other competitors from all over Ontario.

Currently I am experiencing carving in many competition categories which require carving with different exotic woods from the United States and certain areas of Ontario. Such woods as Cotton Wood Bark which has extremely delicate grain requiring a very "STEADY" carving hand.

I also have been working on new interpretive driftwood carving featuring human faces and aquatic sea animals and native hunting scenes. These found pieces of driftwood must be allowed to dry for one year before being carved on, thus having a good supply in my workshop is important.


Carving in all these areas with many different kinds of wood is not an easy thing to do, working with very sharp knife blades and chisels is very dangerous, but every project is carefully planned out and finished in intricate detail. My latest adventure is my "Story Totem Pole" following the chisel carving craft of one of my ancestors.

I find this a very relaxing work, just listening to music with a block of wood in one hand, a knife in the other and just let the wood chips fly. I love adding new pieces to my "Wall Of Wood" & carving display in my garage show casing the journey of my creative path thus far. If I'm able to see just one person or little child laugh or smile at one of my wood creations, then my job is done and I'm a happy carving artist.

## Pete Daize

Pete was born in St. Vincent and the Grenadines in the West Indies. His family moved to Canada in the mid 1950's to escape poverty and start a new life. He grew up in a tough neighbourhood in Toronto called the Junction where he has lived most of his life. He has worked as an Architectural Technologist for many prestigious architectural and engineering firms in the Greater Toronto Area for over four decades.

The acquisition his first digital SLR camera and photo editing software in 2008 were a game changer. They provided the epiphany that digital art and not architecture was his true calling in life. At last Pete's lifelong aspiration of one day become a graphic artist manifested itself.

Pete is a self-taught digital artist – a craft he's pursued with a passion for the last decade. He is currently a member of the North Perth Arts and Culture Council in Listowel and the Kitchener- Waterloo Society of Artists.

From an early age Pete has had an obsession with creating art. Five decades in the architectural profession taught him about symmetry, colour and aesthetics. His keen interest in photography and a smattering of art classes over the same period have contributed to his knowledge of art.

Pete's decision to transition from photography to digital art was a seamless one. He chose the latter because of the limitations of photography which limits the artist to one possibility. Digital art on the other hand opens up a whole new universe with its unlimited possibilities for artistic expression. Digital art, he contends, gives you the opportunity to spread your wings and let your imagination/creativity take flight. And for Pete the feeling is euphoric!

In a nutshell, Digital Art is built upon multiple layers. It begins with a photographic image that lays the groundwork on which Pete's art is built upon, therefore the photograph must meet the stringent criteria for a good composition. Using artificial intelligence an original photographic image can morph into an abstract, a surreal composition or it can mimic the technique of the master painters and a plethora of other creative effects to satisfy the stringent criteria for his artistic visions. Digital art with its inherent artificial intelligence has created a new renaissance for creatives like him by making it possible for an original photographic image to take on a new persona during its multiple incarnations. Because of Digital Art, Pete is like a child in a candy factory exploring and exploiting all the artistic possibilities the algorithms has to offer.

But Pete cautions that this new technology is not all fun and games; a lot of time and effort goes into each new incarnation of the original image. A digital brush or technique that works for one composition does not necessarily work for another. With so many options at your fingertips finding the right treatment for your composition can be both frustrating and a daunting task.

One thing Pete doesn't believe in is to limit himself by specializing in one style or genre of art which he argues stifles creativity, but thankfully, digital art gives him that flexibility and freedom. Pete's artworks are a labour of love and the incessant need to create art is embedded in his DNA!
